The envelope containing 4670/AB has the following written on the outside: "The Bulrush Caterpiller - New Zealand Sent me by Mister /?/ Christmas, 1891 being a plant which takes possession of the body of an insect which it makes the foundation from which it uses its stem & the source from which it derives its support - This plant always exactly fills the body of the Caterpillar & has a stem from 6 to 10 inches high -(Sphoenia Rebertsia) Native name (Aweto) Sent from Auckland. Nov. 11 / 1891 Alexander Ailand Hood".
