There is a story to the effect that there was a mouse who ate rocks from the limestone islands south of the island of Koror and that this and other stones like it were the resulting feces. There used to be many such stones, but today there are only a few. They were used in the men's houses and the council houses in cortests of skill and strength. The object was to grasp the stone at one of the ends with only one hand and to carry it as far as possible. The stones were carried inside the men's houses and possibly on the stone platforms outside.

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
