OKENE SILK from the town of Okene in the Kwara State referred to as a " 3 piece" length of Okene Silk. It is woven from imported silk thread. The weaver is a woman named:

Aisetu Salamatu

She is of the Igbirra people clan: Ozidu (children of the lion)

Designs on Okene silk are taken from simple things such as mats (not particularly symbolic) There is a craft center at Okene from which this fabric came. 1972

This piece can be washed in gentle suds. Cool iron.
