OKENE SILK from the town of Okene in Kwara State referred to as a "3 piece" length of Okene silk.

It is woven from imported silk.

The weaver is a woman named:

Aisetu Salamatu

She is of the Igbirra people, clan: Ozidu (children of the lion)

Design on Okene silk are taken from simple things such as mats (not particularly symbolic) There is a craft center at Okenefrom which this piece came. 1972

The piece can be washed in gentle suds. Cool iron.
