Upper section: (middle) The scene is largely defaced, but according to Chinese scholars it presents Duke Huan kung, Duke of Ch'i State (B.C. 684-642), and Kuan-chung (who later became minister of Ch'i State). Kuan-chung is attempting to shoot Huan kung with arrows. In this scene, Huan kung and his brother, Tzu-chiu 3 (m) were returning from exile to quarrel over the succession to the throne (for detailed description, see Jung keng, p. 29).

Lower section: The scene illustrates a procession moving from right to left. The pictures and captions are largely defaced. The caption accompanying the first horsedrawn chariot on the right is difficult to recognize, but according to the record, the chariot bears the person for whom the shrine was erected, and the caption reads ARRIVET (apparently the deceased at this time was an official in charge of Lang-chung, corresponding to a senior secretary of a board / see Jung Keng, p. 297). The caption of the second horse-drawn chariot reads ARRIVET (chariot of Wu-kuan-yùan). The picture and caption of the third horse-drawn chariot are entirely defaced, but according to Chinese records, the shrine was erected for the person in this chariot, and the caption read ARRIVET (the deceased was an Inspector of the Market).
