Rope or string is a natural bush rope made of bark/bast of a tree called <u>war anao</u>. Rope also called <u>war anao</u>. Reddish color from a tree in the bush called <u>nunjil</u> mixed with lime (<u>wiew</u>). Some nylon fishing line also used.

Following items are attached:

cowries (<u>cameo</u>) gathered on the reef at Ali nassa shell (<u>cai</u>) bought at Aitape market for K1-00 for a small bottle.

Job's tears (krup) gathered along the road at Aitape. beads (raring) bought at Wewak shells (cul) gathered on the beach at Ali. This is a larger kind of cowrie.
